Deadline 2/5 English - Feasibility Report

(A feasibility report states the topic, research question, organizing questions and includes a working bibliography. In addition, students should speculate as to where else they might be able to find sources. All of these aspects were worked on during the previous two weeks. If at any point during the previous two weeks the student finds out that their topic choice cannot be done, they should consult their teachers and a new topic will be assigned. **The topic that students include as part of their feasibility report is the topic they will be required to complete.**)

(Students choose to create an exhibit, a performance, a media project or a paper. Guidelines for these are in the History Day rulebook provided for the students to use. Models of previous projects are also available.)

- English - Writing an annotated bibliography. Students are expected to include at least one source from outside the school library.

Writing a research summary and a title page

Deadline 3/16 Final Project due

(This includes the project, title page, research summary and annotated bibliography. It also include all notecards used for the project.)

Of Special Note:

All parts of the project will be introduced and discussed in class as described in the preceding schedule. However, much of the work may need to be completed as homework.

Students will be provided with a checklist used for grading the final project at the beginning of the project. They should consult this regularly. Certain aspects of the project (also found on the checklist) like interpreting and analyzing sources, using correct spelling and grammar, etc. are a regular part of classroom work and students, therefore, will be expected to use those skills accordingly.

Students will also be allowed to work together on projects with **PRIOR TEACHER APPROVAL**. However, all students will be expected to complete all steps individually (with the exception of developing a research question) up to the point of creating the mock up, story board, or outline. At that point, students may combine their work. Students working together will receive similar grades on the final project (special circumstances may be considered), but individual grades on all parts up to the mock up, story board, outline. **STUDENTS WHO WORK TOGETHER SHOULD CHOOSE THEIR PARTNERS WISELY**. The pros and cons of working individually or with a partner will be discussed briefly in class.
